Immediately get into the left hand lane
Make a “soft left” at 5 way intersection

From Los Angeles/South Pasadena

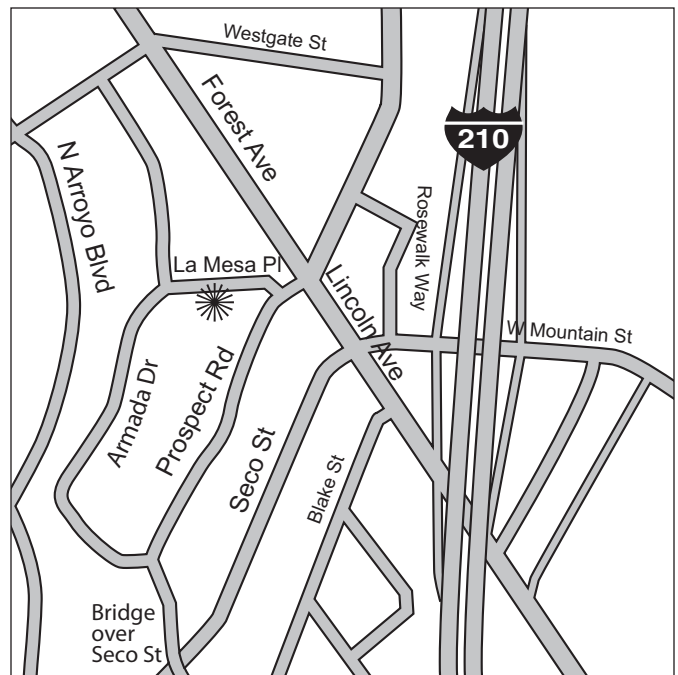
From the Civic Center,

Redistricting Marches On!

Work continues on redistricting in the 10-city LWV PA area. The following excerpt from LWV California gives us the latest news on state redistricting, including links to more information.

Supreme Court Upholds Redistricting Maps

The redistricting maps drawn by the independent California Citizens Redistricting Commission have made it over their first major hurdle. Two lawsuits had been filed in the California Supreme Court, one challenging the state Senate maps and the other challenging the Congressional district maps. The court ruled on October 26, unanimously upholding the maps.

But the threats continue. Two referendums, one on the maps for the state Senate, and one on the Congressional maps, have been cleared for signature gathering. The signature-gathering effort on the Senate maps referendum has received large infusions of money recently. [\$800,000 was contributed by a single donor – MCN] The deadline for signatures is November 13. The League of Women Voters is opposed to both of the referendums. We feel the new process used to select the Citizens Redistricting Commission and their process of drawing the maps has been an overwhelming success and oppose the efforts to overturn the new maps.

Los Angeles County: The County Board of Supervisors adopted a redistricting plan on September 27, culminating a process of committee work and hearings that became very animated. More than a thousand came to testify on the issue of making major changes in districts in response to growth of the Latino population. The final result with only minor changes in the supervisorial districts was arranged in a closed session and had not been viewed by the public prior to the vote. See the new map at:

City of Pasadena: A 9-member Task Force has been meeting since the end of August and holding public hearings in various parts of town. A decision on voting district boundaries is expected in February or March, 2012. See the schedule of meetings, minutes and audio of meetings at:

LWVPA November Board Summary

The Board met on November 9, 2011. The following were main areas of discussion for the November meeting.

- ★ The Board recommended that Pasadena League members contact their Pasadena City Council representative and stress the need to support the inclusion of the original 8th Guiding Principle language into the City of Pasadena's General Plan when it is approved next spring. The words "shared responsibility" and "public" have been removed, but are key words in the original statement, "A vibrant public education system will be valued and supported as the shared responsibility of our community."
- ★ The Board approved the implementation of a flexible membership dues option.
- ★ The Membership Committee will have T-shirts available which encourage folks to "OCCUPY THE POLLS. REGISTER AND VOTE."
- ★ The Board approved general plans for a community forum in February to educate the community about privatization.
- ★ The League Day program for March will be consensus questions on the issue of privatization.

As I write this, my dearest friend is in the ICU, still being her irrepressible, feisty self. Prognosis is pretty good. It got me to thinking about what is important—our families, our friends, our country, this world of ours, and of course, the work of the League.

One of the things that makes us important, is our ability to think about issues beyond ourselves and to educate us and our community about them. We definitely live in interesting times. Whether this is a blessing or a curse, it is a challenge and an opportunity to make a difference.

One of the challenges we have always faced here in Southern California is water. The north has the majority of the water and we in the south need more than we have locally available. In fact, if you talk to people, even Leaguers, from even just a little north of us in Kern County, we are the bad guys draining them dry. We already use less water per capita than our northern cousins and the rest of the country.

One water company in Orange County is already using reclaimed water in its mix for home consumption. Considering that the water we have now is the same water the earth was created with, we are actually using recycled water. San Diego presently imports between 80 and 90 percent of its water. They are dependent on the farmers in Imperial County continuing to fallow their land so that the water from the farmers' Colorado River water allocation can go to the urban areas. Many LA County water districts are working on reclamation and settling water runoff in aquifers for use in dry times. Metropolitan Water District, where Pasadena gets 40 percent of its water, is now guaranteeing to provide water in only three out of ten years. Jack Sullivan, the LA County League Natural Resources Chair, said that there is some talk of renewed water wars. Stay tuned, we are already in interesting times.

Somehow, with conserving, ingenuity, forward thinking water districts, and plain good luck, we will weather this also. Have you thought of replacing your lawn with ground cover and shrubs? A majority of urban water is used for landscaping.

The War on Voting?

LWVUS President Elisabeth MacNamara was recently a guest on NPR's On Point program to address the issue of new laws in several states that put onerous requirements on citizens trying to register and vote. It's a discouraging and frightening trend.

The League has been fighting against these laws for several years beginning in Florida, which passed a law that would have placed severe restrictions on any third-party group (like the League) who wanted to register voters. The League sued the State of Florida and won. However, the Florida Legislature recently passed another law that went even further and the League does not have the resources at this time to fight it.

The show features input from both sides of the issue: those who are adamant that there is massive voter fraud and that these laws are the only way to stop it, and those who see the laws as unnecessary, costly, and detrimental to the democratic process. President MacNamara cited the case of an elderly woman who had been voting for years but was recently denied a voter ID card because the name on her birth certificate didn't match her married name.

Civil Rights Lawyers Launch Interactive Map To Explain Voting Requirements For Each State

“The Lawyers’ Committee for Civil Rights Under Law has launched an Interactive “Map of Shame,” which is designed to educate citizens about their voting rights. Users hover their computer mouse over a state and the map of that state explains what the requirements are for voting in the 2012 presidential election.

“The Map of Shame shows the status of Voter ID and other laws that have the effect of suppressing the turnout of eligible voters on elections,” the Lawyers’ Committee said in a statement.

The map offers state-specific information on new requirements for registering to vote and voting. For states that have the strictest laws, the “Map of Shame” provides voter-ID tool kits with detailed information on every step of the process for obtaining and qualifying for a photo ID.

Roll Your Money to LWVPA

A current IRS provision allows those over 70 ½ years of age to roll over up to \$100,000 of their IRA funds (traditional roll over IRA accounts only) to a qualified charitable organization. Such donated funds are not considered as federal taxable income. (However such tax free donated funds may not be counted as a charitable deduction.) For many people, this will be advantageous tax wise. Also, such funds can be considered a part of your “Required Minimum Distribution”.

Our League of Woman Voters Education Fund is such a qualified charitable organization. Your IRA holding organization can provide details on how this donation can be arranged. The donation check must be made out to the League of Women Voters Ed Fund. Send the check to our office (1353 North Hill Ave., Pasadena 91104) for deposit in our Ed Fund account.

Note that the current IRS provision expires December 31, 2011. It is not yet clear if this will be extended, so please act quickly.

Why Did California Crack Up?

Did you know that the first California constitution, created in 1849, was copied from Iowa's and was put together by a bunch of miners that couldn't wait to get back to the Sierras to make their fortunes? That constitution had nothing about how the state would pay for services, but relied on borrowing from the federal government. And did you know that the second Constitutional Convention in 1878 solicited two ideas from each delegate and when the delegates got bored and frustrated they just left and the ideas were all lumped together into a constitution with no editing? These were just a couple of the interesting historical facts presented by Joe Mathews, co-author of *California Crack Up*, at the November Lunch With the League.

Joe said that many of the problems we're experiencing today in California stem from these early days of statehood. Our system of government—actually three systems—wasn't designed. It was just thrown together. Our election system is not sized for California's population; we're the least represented population of any state. Our governing system has so many special rules that a minority can stop virtually anything. And our initiative system, the most restrictive in the country, does not allow for modification of an initiative or undoing it except by another vote. As he put it, "We're ruled by the ghosts of the past."

What to do? Joe had three suggestions. First, change our election system to multi-member districts with proportional representation. We are a regional state and we need to think that way. We also need more legislators so that people are better represented. Second, we need to get rid of many of the rules governing spending and fiscal management. Finally, we need to modify the initiative process. Initiatives should be on a separate calendar from other elections. We should allow more time to qualify initiatives so that grassroots efforts would have a better chance against big money. Amending initiatives up front should be allowed, along with counter-proposals. We also need to make referenda a larger part of the picture.

Finally, we need to stop searching for someone or something to blame. It's too simplistic and only makes the problem worse. We need another Constitutional Convention that would perhaps use the US Constitution as a model. (Our constitution is 20 times the size of the

US Constitution.) It appears we have our work cut out for us. And, by the way, Joe Mathews is moving to South Pasadena and is a brand-new member of LWVPA!!!

We also heard an update from Frances Talbott-White about Smart Voter, the LWV California's award-winning election web site.

Life in the Foreign Service

I was 27 years old and working as a secretary for the L.A. County Assessor's Office. After meeting some people who talked endlessly about their extraordinary experiences of foreign service life, this was the beginning of my desire to travel and see the world. After a 15-month long application process, I joined the Department of State's Foreign Service as an office manager at the embassy in Quito.

More than 35 years later, I retired in April 2010. I had the honor of serving in 15 countries around the world, in four continents on regular assignments lasting from two to four years, and as a “rover” during this summer for 90 days in Kabul, Afghanistan. After retirement I had the option of serving where the need was most if asked, and because I had served in Kabul for a year in 2005-2006, I was happy to return for the summer.

I have enjoyed both the responsibilities and benefits that come with representing the United States overseas. I've had one of the most exciting lives anybody could possibly want. I served in places as diverse as Hong Kong, Venezuela, Indonesia, Peru and Bogota. I've been shot at by Guatemalan soldiers during the Death Squad era because I happened not to see a barricade posted a few blocks from my home; I lived through two coups in Haiti; and I happened to be in Bogota, Colombia during the capture of the infamous drug war lord Pablo Escobar.



The life of a diplomat long has been associated with glitz and glamour, and to some extent that perception holds true. American diplomats are still some of the most sought-after people in capitals around the world, even though not everyone today wants to be a friend of the United States. But life in the Foreign Service today, especially in Third World hardship posts, hardly matches the images of striped-pants diplomats sipping expensive cocktails at extravagant parties. Polluted drinking water, severe pollution, terrorists, blackouts, malaria and other diseases are facts of life in dozens of overseas posts.

Constant security threats in countries such as Colombia, Haiti and Liberia and in areas such as the Middle East make living conditions even harder. I don't think the average American has to remain vigilant of hostile surveillance (either from terrorists or foreign intelligence agencies), varying routes and times of travel so as to make themselves a hard target, nor do they have to have their car searched for bombs every time they park at work.

As I mentioned above, I retired about a year ago but I could not stay away. I spent more than half of my life in the Service, and cutting the umbilical cord was one of the hardest things I had to do. Living in different countries is culturally enriching and creates a world I would not have acquired in the United States.
